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Clinic Summary Notes

Clinic Topic: Practical Application of Teaching Aids – Scott Giffin scottgif1@gmail.com

- 1. Teaching aids can have practical and creative applications. How do we use them to teach and strengthen solid fundamentals? Aids should not limit independence or be considered as a means to an end, but instead provide progress toward greater independence and learning.
- 2. Do students have prior experience with different types of teaching aids? What other off-snow activities do they enjoy? Focus on prior experiences; current goals and motivations can create connection and enhance lesson success.
- 3. When using an aid, consider how it promotes and reinforces the fundamentals. How does it affect body performance? Does it have the intended effect on the skis/board?
- 4. Creative uses can be fun and enhance motivation but ensure the aid is having a positive effect on ski/board performance.
- 5. Always consider safety. How does it affect chairlift loading/unloading? Could it cause injury if it falls from the chairlift? Could it cause harm to you or the student? Is it safe in the current environment (terrain, traffic, etc.).
