What apparel or gear challenges do you face?

During our roundtable, we talked about:

- Clothing challenges related to a lower limb prosthetic, including:
 - The prosthetic tearing or wear away pants,
 - Access to prosthetics, and
 - Whether inseam zippers make dressing easier.
- Clothing challenges related to sit skis, including:
 - The limited seated jacket options
 - Excess fabric gathering at the lap
 - What to do with the back of a jacket when it's not long enough to sit on comfortably but not loose enough to go over the sit ski.

- Temperature regulation challenges, including:
 - Cooling
 - Warming
 - Considerations when in water, such as wetsuits which don't always work; restrict mobility; and are difficult to put on and take off.
- The steep price of adaptive apparel, especially considering it may not even work for your particular needs.

- Lower limb prosthetic solutions:
 - No Limbits pants (discount link available via session flyer QR code)
 - Reinforcing the inside of pants
- The limited seated jacket options:
 - Koolway Sports
 - Eddie Bauer Flyline Adaptive Jacket (right - not currently

for sale)

- Tessier offers two jacket
 options
- Sizing up or down to better accommodate specific needs



Have you found any hacks or work arounds?

- Temperature regulation solutions:
 - Cooling: Lululemon's Everlux fabric; Knox cooling base layer; Zerofit which offers cooling and warming base layers
 - Warming Cold weather base layers make a huge difference



- Accessibility tools such as zipper chains and button hooks.
- Closures such as boat shaped buttons (below, left) and snaps with grasps (below, right).

What solutions would you want to see developed?

As we daydreamed about adaptive apparel, we talked about:

- A resale or donation platform for adaptive apparel to help people exchange products that did not work for them but may work for someone else.
- Hair accessories and tools to make doing your hair easier, allowing people with lifelong and newly developed disabilities to keep their hair long / styled how they would like it.
- A universal design pant solution with reinforced and padded knees for those with prosthetics, older people, and people that kneel often (gardeners, construction workers, etc).
- A more accessible wetsuit that is easier to put on and off, and provides more warmth, especially for kids and smaller/slimmer people.

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
