Clinic Title: 2-Day Workshop: The Unconventional Monoskier – Geoff Krill

1. Every monoski is not the correct choice for every student. Have an understanding of potential differences and adaptations to create the perfect learning scenario for your students.
2. Researching monoski designs and manufacturers to have a better understanding of each one's strengths and weaknesses.
3. Remember loading and unloading independence may be a factor in your equipment choice.
4. Student assessment is key to choosing a monoski vs. another piece of sit-down equipment. Background information in the student file is just a brief snapshot of the situation. "Interview for Success."
5. Familiarize yourself with different loading procedures and safety protocols as they relate to various monoskis and school protocols.
